





Mark Twain Erupts! "Religion, Politics and the Whole Damned Human Race"



November 2, 1pm (or so, following the potluck) in the sanctuary. Former UBCer Jim Ketcham puts on the persona of Mark Twain for this hour-long presentation. Twain (1835–1910) was a prolific writer, observer of American culture and human foibles, and public intellectual who spoke to audiences everywhere he went. His topics are relevant to our time.

Jim Ketcham is, of course, no stranger to many of us at UBC.

Jim and his wife (Jan Curtis) lived in Roseville for 18 years. Jim served as our Interim Minister from June 1990 to September 1992. Jan was active in the bell and choral choir for many years, and after a "decent interval," Jim was asked to return as a member of the congregation and he also played in the Bell

Choir. Their son John was dedicated by Rev. Dr. Nadean Bishop in the UBC sanctuary in 1996. John is about to turn 30 and is a Captain in the Army Military Police. He's currently serving in Poland, where Western allies are hoping to put on a strong front in response to Putin's incursions. Prayers for John and his company of soldiers, please!


2nd Annual First Congregational Church Toy Giveaway

After the service, staff and volunteer sound engineers got the performance areas ready in the sanctuary, in the assembly room, and on the lawn. 13th Avenue was closed off between

and began to feed volunteers. Vendors set up their tables under tents on the boulevard (left).

Stories from Our History

UBC Bell Banners

or the past 41 years, two big macrame banners covered with ribbons and bells have been part of UBC worship on the first Sunday of November, representing all the saints of our community. They appear at other times, too, especially memorials and celebrations of life. When and how did this tradition begin?

Inspiration for the UBC bell banners occurred when member Allen McCormack attended the 1984 General Conference of the United Methodist Church as one of many advocates for the full inclusion of LGBTQ folks. Conference participants had already experienced the loss of many of their members due to the AIDS epidemic. To celebrate and memorialize their dear friends, plain banners were presented to the group. They were asked to write names of people to remember on small ribbons and then use the ribbons to tie small bells to the banners. These bell banners were subsequently used during conference worship, praying for those lost and for those mourning.

The effect of the bell banners was moving and electrifying. Allen was so moved that he brought the bell-banner idea back to the UBC Liturgy Committee, precursor to the Worship Planning Team.

Member Susan Hayles volunteered to macrame two hangings. We went to Pier 1 to buy small brass bells and to the fabric store for thin satin ribbons and safety pins. We chose light pastel ribbons so the names would show up in colors of the Easter resurrection. Someone (possibly Neil Lubke) found two closet poles, screwed in eye hooks, and made and painted heavy wooden stands.

A couple weeks before All Saints Sunday 1984, we introduced the banners to the congregation and invited them to add bells and ribbons for any of the UBC saints and any of their personal saints. The bell banners were carried into the sanctuary, processing during the singing of the opening hymn, "For All the Saints," joining the sound of the bells with the congregational singing.

In the passing years, the bells of our saints have added their sound (and weight) to the banners. The banners became a poignant part of memorial services as families added their loved ones' bells to the banners. Some bells have been added in private. In 2001, four bells were attached representing each of the four planes that crashed on 9/11.

Now the banners and saints routinely join memorial and All Saints services and are a treasured part of our tradition.

Allen McCormack was part of UBC 1982-1997 and currently lives in Indiana. Jean Lubke came to UBC in 1980 and has served in many

capacities, currently as bell choir director and congregational president.
