From the Pastor

Be Ready. That's the Biblical injunction to attend to the tasks at hand. Sometimes we can predict the course of time. And sometimes, a health crisis or a shooting or an unplanned visitor comes along and our best laid plans go by the wayside.



Be Ready

There are two kinds of time in the Greek

language. The first is Chronos. It's where we get chronological. It's the accumulation of hours and days and months and years. It's where we plan out our schedules. Like the budgeting process, we try to plan for what we expect to happen. Like the discernment process, we make two- to five-year plans. Nothing much happens during chronos time. Well, nothing and everything. We flip our calendar and we think we know what the future has in store for us.

The second kind of time is kairos. Kairos is God's time. It's interrupted time. It's when something falls in your lap. It's when something is revealed and we know we must act.

The killing of George Floyd was a kairos moment. God was revealed in the cries of the city and the passion to

pay attention to white supremacy and the ways its tentacles have infected us.

The anti-immigration stance of the last administration was a wake-up call, a kairos moment for how the US has treated our immigrant siblings. UBC responded by becoming a sanctuary congregation and housing asylees for over four years. But as

we looked deeper, we noticed that immigrants have been an easy scapegoat for many of our problems. We also realize that each administration has failed to fix a broken immigration system.

The pandemic was a kairos moment. We shifted our plans to keep each other safe and we recognized how constant vigilance was not only about the spread of the disease but also the spread of misinformation and meanness disguised as deadly self-interest.

Wars in Ukraine, Israel and Gaza are kairos moments when the challenge of peacemaking is so starkly revealed. Our voices and our actions are so desperately needed.

I remember my mentor and friend George Williamson saying that sometimes there's a lull between kairos events in the life of the church. People get bored or restless, thinking that they need to manufacture the next kairos moment. But by definition, those kairos moments are not our doing. They are God's action in our midst. Our job is to stay awake. To pay attention. To pray. To prepare ourselves for the next kairos. For God will reveal God's heart to a hurting world.

The challenge for the church is to respond to the kairos moments. By definition, they interrupt our chronos plans. But that's also the good news. We have learned to adapt, respond, stay awake. And we always seek to respond with compassion, mercy and a passion for doing what's right.

The church at its best is the place/the community that nurtures the passionate zeal that typifies God's presence in the world. As we discern the present and the future, pay attention to and make room for the kairos of God to break through.

Blessed be this kairos community.

Well, best laid plans...

I had a second stress test on February 22 in preparation for my neurosurgery and they found that something was off. I had an angiogram the next day and it confirmed three blocked arteries one 99% blocked. No wonder I've been feeling chest pressure. So, the neurosurgery has been postponed for a few months.

On Friday, March 1, I will have three stents put in. Since I'll be on blood thinners for three months following the stents, I won't be able to have the pituitary surgery until the blood thinners are out of my system. The good news is that we caught this before I had a heart attack.

I will probably not be coming in to work for two weeks so I can have the best chance for healing. Rev. Anne Supplee is ready and willing to help out where needed. I thank everyone for their prayers, support and flexibility.



Most of our income (57%) comes from pledges made by members. Pledges are slightly ahead as some people prepaid their annual pledge.

Expected annual rental income is 21% of our budget. Property Manager Patrick Mavity does a great job renting



Other gifts and miscellaneous income provide 5% of our budget. We have had some generous donations of late.

The Foundation distribution is 17%, which includes \$33,399 for the property manager position. The Foundation funds are transferred to the UBC checking

out spaces that don't have a regular tenant. Due to account as needed by the treasurer. timing of this newsletter, some rent for February has not yet been received.
