From the Pastor

Reflections from Dexter's Garden

Back in November of 2022, six UBCers visited Montgomery, Alabama, for an Alliance of Baptists Conference entitled, "Excavating our Roots". We visited the Legacy Museum and Monument (<u>https://legacysites.eji.org/about/museum</u>) and learned about the roots of White Supremacy and the Doctrine of Discovery.

THE KING-JOHNS GARDEN FOR REFLECTION Many believe that it was by Divine intervention that the two most well-known ministers of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church - Vernon Johns (1941 - 1952) and Martin Luther Kingle. (1954 - 1960) - had consecutive pastorates on the eve of the modern Civil Rights Movement. They were men of action, deeply rooted in philosophy and religious faith. Rev Johns mgel his congregation to fight oppression by becoming conomically independent; he believed that self determination was the hallmark of a people's claim to freedom. Dr. King taught non-violent resistance to oppression as a means of achieving social and political parity. Both men believed that the blessings of liberty were secured by direct action. In the serenity of this garden, you are invited to reflect upon six timeless themes about which Rev. Johns and Dr. King often preached, locenced and wrote: lectured and wrote: PEACE - UNDERSTANDING - UNITY We encourage you to ponder each one as it relates to you, your family and your community. Here, in the shadow of Rev. Johns' and Dr. King's pastoral home, may you find the personal fulfillment that is often the first step on the long journey to a better world.

A couple of us visited the parsonage of the Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church where Vernon Johns and Martin Luther King and their families lived (see photo below.) In the back yard, we came across a garden that held six benches, each one with a different word on which to reflect. So, during Eastertide, we're going to do exactly that. We're going to linger a week each on these six words – Equality, Hope, Forgiveness, Unity, Peace, Understanding – each a piece of the puzzle for a nonviolent lifestyle.

the f word: stories of forgiveness

Forgiveness cuts public opinion down the middle like a guillotine. It is a word that inspires and affronts in equal measure. To some, it is weak and offensive, while to others it is a form of self-defiance, the only way to live with the past without being held captive by it. These stories show the highly personal, diverse and complex nature of forgiveness.

The F Word exhibition was created by The Forgiveness Project, an organization that uses personal stories to explore how concepts of reconciliation, conflict resolution and dialogue can be used to break cycles of violence and restore hope.

Guest speakers on April 14 and 21: Louisa Hext will introduce the exhibit and the Forgiveness Project at the forum on April 14. Then on April 21, the Forgiveness Project cofounder, London-based journalist and author Marina Cantacuzino, will speak at UBC as part of her 10-day US tour around the release of her book, Forgiveness: An Exploration (Simon & Schuster, 2022 in the UK). She will give a lay sermon during the service, and the forum will focus on her book, which will be available for sale. Louisa will be present that day as well.

The F Word: Stories of Forgiveness exhibition is a thought-provoking collection of arresting images and personal narratives exploring forgiveness in the face of atrocity. Drawing together voices from South Africa, America, Israel, Palestine, Northern Ireland and England, the exhibition examines forgiveness as a healing process, a path out of victimhood and, ultimately, a journey of hope.

In addition, the forum on **April 14** will introduce the exhibit with a presentation by Louisa Hext, the North American curator. Cofounder Marina Cantacuzino will be here with Louisa on **April 21** while on her US book tour for *Forgiveness:* <u>An Exploration</u> and will preach and talk at the forum. Appeal to support policies for increased wages for early childcare educators and providers, and for funding to cap childcare costs

Dianne Haulcy is one of my sheroes. She is the President and CEO of the Family Partnership which is an organization that has been around for decades in the Twin Cities whose work is to disrupt intergenerational cycles of poverty, adversity and trauma through mental health service, early childhood education, family home visiting, anti-sex trafficking and advocacy services.

She also works with MPR to produce the Early Risers Podcast which discusses ways that parents can raise antiracist children. Finally, she is the chair of the Northside Achievement Zone board.

In an editorial in the MinnPost she recently wrote to highlight the dividends that our state's investments in children and families will pay in both monetary and social outcomes. The purpose of the article, though, was to urge individuals to contact their legislators and argue for them to support policies that increase wages for early childcare educators and providers and for funding to cap child care costs. UBC Discernment Process Update

On March 9, 19 UBCers met in person and 9 UBCers joined via Zoom to further the work of our discernment process. We brainstormed, discussed, listened, challenged, word smithed, wrestled, and listened some more. Our direction is beginning to come into focus.

We've reached consensus on our practical vision. These are not a succinct Vision Statement as we may be accustomed, but rather areas that answer the question: "What do we want to see in place in 2-5 years as a result of OUR actions?" (NOTE: These are not listed in any sequence or priority order.)

- An imaginative, sustainable building plan
- Relationally inclusive ministry, partnerships, and leadership
- Realistic growth strategies
- Efficient and accessible organizational operations (including staff and volunteers)
- A thriving, diverse, and collaborative music program
- A clear definition and claiming of our identity and our voice
- Active participation and support of social progress and justice
- A sense of belonging through intergenerational support and growth

Then we dug deep and answered the really difficult question: "What is blocking US from moving toward our vision?"

- (Our) perfectionism blocks (the) development of strategic action plans and realistic expectations.
- Not prioritizing professional marketing and communication has inhibited our sustainability and mission.
- The fear of losing US is causing a lack of consensus about the building and stopping the congregation from seeking long-term solutions.

 (The) imbalance between our human resources and (our) congregational actions is interfering with the accomplishment of our internal operations and outreach missions.

Whew! Our next steps will occur on May 11. We will begin by identifying our Key Directions – what are the actions WE can do to remove our blocks to achieving our vision? Get your creative, out-of-the-box juices flowing – let's dream! Then we'll analyze the opportunities and craft a Year One priorities action plan. Get ready to act!

FINANCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Most of our income (57%) comes from pledges made by members. Pledges are slightly ahead as some people prepaid their annual pledge.

Expected annual rental income is 21% of our budget. Property Manager Patrick

Mavity does a great job renting out spaces that don't have a regular tenant. As a result, we have a surplus in this category.

Other gifts and miscellaneous income provide 5% of our budget. We have had some generous donations of

late. In addition, not noted in this chart, we received a grant from American Baptist Churches – Rochester Genesee region to partially cover the expenses for our discernment retreats.

The Foundation distribution is 17%, which

includes \$33,399 for the property manager position. The Foundation funds are transferred to the UBC checking account as needed by the treasurer.

Contribution from the UBC Memoir Group

A Neighborhood Corporation

The young homeowners of our Marcy-Holmes Neighborhood were deeply concerned in that spring of 1965 as we witnessed a number of family-owned very nice older homes around us being bought up by one particular absentee landlord and converted into shabby cheap rooming houses. He bought with cash from unsuspecting older widows who had raised their families in the big homes and needed now to move out quickly for health reasons.

The neighborhood had always been a mixture of owner occupants with young children, students and faculty at the University, and some young working folks as well as some older long-term residents. But the mix was rapidly deteriorating as many absentee landlords were converting homes to rental property and exploiting the younger renters. It was a rapidly changing neighborhood, and mumblings of concern rose up from number of young families who were worried about the changes.

One beloved older resident suggested that a group gather together to discuss the problem and plan some course of action. "Could we meet at your place?", she asked us. "We need as large a living room as we can find. And your boys are little and go to bed early so we can meet at your house nicely".

Cork and I agreed to serve as the gathering place and the meeting was set for our house. We knew that feelings would be strong and plans needed to be made quickly so we gathered all the chairs we could find and put out all our ash trays for the large group that would be sharing intense feelings in our living room. It turned out to be a smoky room with some people even sitting on the floor. Folks were invited to come informally and to bring their friends who might also share their concern and want to look for solutions. It was warm enough to keep the front door open as 23 folks straggled in to the circle of neighbors. I perched on my stairway for a seat and surveyed the crowd below me. There was a Republican businessman, a Medical School faculty member, an older housewife, a Democratic City Councilman, a young graduate student, and a high-school biology teacher. The list was as varied as our community.

One of the long-time residents outlined for us the extent of the problem and presented some suggestions. It was finally decided to form a legal company called The First Southeast Corporation. We all agreed to fund it by buying stock in our company. One of our neighbors who was a lawyer offered to do the legal work pro bono. Another neighbor who was a realtor agreed to work for us at no cost. We elected a Board of Directors who could proceed to buy properties guickly when they came on the market and as they used the neighborhood grapevine. They would do what needed to be done to renovate the property, and then sell to an owner occupant who would live in the home. The stocks were \$100 a share, and \$9000 was raised that very evening as people opened their check books and wrote out the amount of stock they were purchasing.

After the last neighbor left, Cork and I folded the bridge table chairs, picked up the pillows, and emptied the ash trays. We sank down on our sofa and looked at each other in amazement. We had just bought 3 shares at \$100 each with our meagre savings. It was in a new company and we might never see that money again; but we had joined with our neighbors in a real plan to hold the line against absentee landlord exploitation. It was exciting and awing, and there was work to be done.

Our first property was acquired the next month in July of 1965 with a down payment of \$750. We knew by the neighborhood grapevine about the coming *Continued on page 18*

availability of that particular house and had wanted to beat out the absentee landlord in purchasing it before Later we sold it to a family after a year of him. renovation and negotiation, and at a small profit to the First Southeast Corporation. Actually, our corporation never declared dividends because we just plowed any profits back into the next house that we bought. From that historic meeting in our living room in 1965 until 2002, the First Southeast Corporation handled 20 properties, helped families become homeowners, and made an impact on the community simply by its existence. It said to the current, existing homeowners: "We are here and we are at work and you do not need to flee to the suburbs." It was our community at work in an unprecedented way.

A new opportunity opened for us after a few years as the Federal Government under L.B. Johnson and the Congress provided additional funds and different ways to provide affordable housing in city neighborhoods.

This time developers of Section 8 Housing were given funds to encourage them to build new housing, but they must work with a non-profit organization in the local area. Since we were a for-profit organization, we could not help in this unless we made a change. The Board and the stock holders quickly decided to continue our for-profit organization called The First Southeast Corporation and its work, but in addition to form a not-for-profit organization called The Second Southeast Corporation. Now we had a way of accepting Government Funds and applying for grants.

Under this umbrella a number of new housing units were built as Section 8 Housing for renting to families—families, again, in the widest sense of the word. You can see these buildings today at 35W between Como and Talmage Avenues.

Sometimes, though, even our two new corporations were not able to move fast enough to buy a good property before the absentee landlord arrived with his cash in his hand. One day my telephone rang with Diane's frantic voice on the other end of the line calling to ask my help. "We need to move right now today--if we are going to buy Marie's property that just came on the market today! I can't get hold of the Chair of the Foundation who is working. What can we do?" It was a desperate situation. We knew the former owner who had died; we knew and had met in her house while she was an active member of our Board; we knew the urgency of buying in that particular block.

So, the two of us—two young mothers at home with tots-- contacted the Realtor and put down the Earnest Money ourselves between the two of us with checks from our personal family bank accounts. It was with a bit of concern that I contacted my husband later and informed him we had just bought a house together with another couple. We also contacted the Chairman of the Board of the First Southeast Corporation and asked him to get his Board to buy it from us as soon as possible.

That evening there gathered in our living room before a flickering fire the Johnsons and the Lassmans with glasses of wine – two couples who were celebrating the wives who had bought themselves an extra house and the patient husbands who were astounded but agreed with the actions their wives had taken.

The First Southeast Corporation continued for 33 years buying, repairing, and selling houses in all three parts of Southeast Minneapolis. The Como and Prospect Park Neighborhoods joined with us after a few years, and properties were renovated there as well. Volunteers from all three neighborhoods gave of their time and effort as well as their money as they, too, purchased stock in the First Corporation. In the end it was the changes in Real Estate financing, the end of Government money, and the fatigue of the eager volunteers which finally brought about the closing of both Corporations. But the initial ideas and efforts had paid off in neighborhood stability for a long period of time; and investors did get their initial \$100 back-- but without interest. We had invested in our neighborhood.
