

In Memoriam Kit Martin – Feb. 1984 -Mar. 2023

We were saddened to hear of the death of UBC member Kit Martin, just a month after his 39th birthday. Kit was a poet, scholar, educator and activist. He did his doctoral work at Northwestern. He worked tirelessly for peace in Southern Sudan. He curated and published sci-fi anthologies, including an essay by Doug Donley. He even edited our newsletter after he moved away for his doctoral work back in 2015. He contracted a rare form of lung cancer a little over a year ago that had sadly metastasized. FINANCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

UBC's budgeted operating income for 2022-23 is \$365,885. This includes the final adjusted amount of \$22,875 carry-forward from 2021-22 fiscal year and the Foundation distribution of \$64,720.

Most of our income (52%) comes from the pledges made by members. We have

a surplus due to some pre-paid pledges. As we enter the last quarter of our fiscal year, please let me know ASAP if you have any changes to your expected pledge.

Expected annual rental income is \$74,000 (20% of our budget.) This is a large increase over last year's \$60,000. Income to date for this item reflects a surplus as our largest renter received a grant and pre-paid some rent. In addition, we've received more than anticipated income from miscellaneous renters.

Other gifts and miscellaneous income provide 4% of our budget. These are mostly gifts made by pledgers beyond their pledge or from people who did not pledge.

The Foundation distribution is 18%, which includes 9% (\$32,053) for the

property manager position. The Foundation funds are transferred to the UBC checking account as needed by the treasurer.

Contribution from the UBC Memoir Group Preschool interracial experiences at UBC

The Nursery at UBC in 1962 was a busy place during the regular worship hour on Sunday mornings. Active two- and three-year-olds vied for attention from the students who were hired to take charge of the nursery and the kids for an hour and a half. There were toys, a box of costumes, picture books near a soft rug, building blocks, and very simple puzzles, and a rocking boat for big muscle play, and a rocking chair for comforting hurt feelings if needed. It was a happy place and was seemingly well-run to give the children fun while the parents had a chance for adult contacts and a worship service on Sunday morning.

One cold winter day in January, my phone rang, and it was Vicki Wilson, one of the young mothers of UBC who had two daughters. "I have an idea", she explained. I could hear her girls in the background playing at their house in the suburbs, and I knew it would be a quick call and she would have to get to the point while she could. My sons would need their lunch soon, too, so we both listened with one eye on our kids.

"There's a gym over there at the church that is unused during the day, and we have these cooped up kids here with the winter wiggles. Why don't we arrange a morning get together once a week for six more weeks, hire us a student caretaker, and provide coffee and conversation for ourselves? The kids could do some big muscle activity down in the Gym part of the time. Would you be willing to do this?" she asked.

There was a shriek in the background at her house and an ominous quiet in my living room around the corner. We both needed to be quick with this conversation. I thought she had a great idea. But then she went on. "I'd like to make it a two-church event and invite a couple of young mothers I know from Zion Baptist Church on the North Side. Maybe we could really make some new friends and discuss some topics of interest to both groups". Vicki and I agreed that it would be a benefit to our own kids to have fun with kids of another color. That really did make it an inspiration to me, and I pitched in eagerly. We divided up the list of folks to call and of the jobs to do to make her idea a reality. We set to work.

Eventually we gathered the two groups of mothers into one group for coffee and our active pent-up kids of both races into another group for physical activity. Our Wednesday morning sessions were underway. For six weeks we began to have a little "interracial experience". It was a chore to have to bundle up a three-year-old in all his layers for a -20-degree temperature, make sure the baby was warm in his carrier, and drive the car through snow covered streets to church. But the reward of exercise for the three-year-old, and care for the baby along with coffee and conversation for me made it all worthwhile.

Can I remember the planned topics of our discussion as parents? No. But we did some real sharing of ideas and stories. Did those early childhood interracial experiences for our children make a big impression? Who knows. But it was a beginning, for us as young mothers and for them as preschoolers. Alliance of Baptists will consider proposal to adopt a statement on apartheid in Israel

UBC is a longstanding member of the nationwide Alliance of Baptists. At the Alliance's annual meeting on April 1 (on Zoom in advance of the spring gathering in Atlanta April 21–23), one of the Alliance's endorsed communities, Justice in Palestine & Israel (JPI), will propose that the Alliance adopt the statement below. The situation in Palestine and Israel, and the U.S. role in that situation, has weighed heavily on my heart for many years. I began attending JPI meetings over the past year after I found them at the 2022 spring gathering. I want to raise awareness and, I hope, support for the Alliance in this thoughtful and critical effort. Proposed Statement for the Alliance of Baptists April 2023

We recognize that the government of Israel's laws, policies, and practices regarding the Palestinian people fulfill the international legal definition of apartheid. Apartheid is legally defined as inhumane acts committed for the purpose of establishing and maintaining domination by one racial group of persons over any other racial group of persons and systematically oppressing them. This occurs in Israel/Palestine through the following:

- A. Establishing two sets of laws and unequal treatment under the law for Israelis and Palestinians. These laws and policies give preferential treatment to Israeli Jews and oppressive or inferior treatment to Palestinians, whether Muslim, Christian, or other, and whether they are residents of the Occupied Territories, refugees, or citizens of Israel;
- B. Causing fragmentation of Palestinian communities with multiple limited statuses, each with their own limitations on human rights (Palestinian citizens of Israel, Palestinians residents of East Jerusalem, Palestinian residents of the West Bank, Palestinian residents of Gaza, and Palestinian refugees);
- C. Expropriating Palestinian land and water for Jewish-only settlements and Israeli military activities;
- D. Forbidding free movement and self-government to Palestinians within the territories that are theirs under international law (the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, and the Gaza Strip);
- E. Dividing the population along racial lines by the creation of separate reserves and ghettos for the Palestinians; and,
- F. Denying Palestinians the right to a nationality.

The Alliance of Baptists urges members, congregations, and staff to seek appropriate ways to bring an end to Israeli apartheid, including through advocacy at the United States federal level with Congress and the administration. Further, we encourage all Alliance congregations to join us in making the following pledge, to be lived out as part of a national ecumenical movement in solidarity with Palestinians:

We, the Alliance of Baptists, affirm our commitment to freedom, justice, and equality for the Palestinian people and all people. We oppose all forms of racism, bigotry, discrimination, and oppression, and we declare ourselves an Apartheid-Free Faith Community. To that end, we pledge to join others in working to end all support to Israel's apartheid regime, settler colonialism, and military occupation.

Special Offering for March and April Peace & Justice

The special Mission offering for March and April will go to organizations which support Peace and Justice initiatives. There are many groups which may receive our donations. Here are some groups we have supported in the past: CAIR (Council on American-Islamic Relations), Alight (formerly American Refugee Services of the MN Council of Churches), RCRC (Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice), WAMM (Women Against Military Madness), Alliance of Baptists, etc.
