From the Pastor

### Lean into the Gospel of liberation, justice, and truthfulness

ecember 2025 in the Twin Cities will be remembered as filled with ICE raids and protests in the streets. People were disappeared and brutally kidnapped by masked agents claiming to be law enforcement.

And the people of the Twin Cities rose up. In the bitter cold, they blew whistles. Group texts mobilized trained observers to go to the sites of the kidnappings. They pulled out their phones and recorded the illegal and unconstitutional actions of the "officers." They made sure they got the names of those detained so their family and friends could hopefully find them. They outnumbered the masked agents by ten times.

They took lessons learned in Minneapolis after George Floyd's murder that community activism and transparency really do make a difference. And they probably helped prevent the next wave of detentions.



I can't help but see the parallels with the nativity stories in Matthew and Luke. The Holy Family had no place to stay, so they made do with a humble cattle stall. Then when Herod escalated his attack on the Hebrew people, they joined the refugee caravan to Egypt. I wonder how many Romans helped smuggle

people to safety, just as God smuggled God's self into a refugee's womb.

What are the implications for us as we seek to be healthy and responsible Christians in this new year?

I'm encouraged by the number of people who have emerged from this bleak midwinter, clinging onto each other and the liberating story of the Gospel. May we lean into the Gospel of liberation, justice, and truthfulness in this New Year. May it change us. May we remember that we are never alone.



### **Stories from Our History**

### **University Baptist Church Fire, January 13, 1970**

It was a bitterly cold January night in Minnesota. Cork and I were sleeping soundly under mounds of covers when the phone rang persistently at 3 a.m. to wake us. Cork reached over to the phone, groggily answered, and then sat up quickly. It was the minister of our church calling him.

"There's been a fire at the church", he spoke urgently, "and I need you to go over there to the building right away." We lived within six blocks of the church and the minister lived in the suburbs. "They have put out the fire, but the Fire Marshall needs an official or church member to walk through with him and verify that the fire is out and sign the papers so the crew can leave. Could you please go over there?"

Cork agreed to help out and pulled on his warmest sweat pants and sweater, spread the covers over me, and tiptoed down the stairs to go to the car. I fell back to sleep, knowing that the fire was out and he would be back soon to our warm bed.

Later at about 5 a.m. I heard the back door slam and his steps as he went down to the basement where he left all his outer smoky clothes. I was happy he was back home again on such a cold night. But it was a different story when he came to our bedroom and neared our bed. The intense acrid smell of recent fire that he brought with him was terrible. Even though he had left most of his clothes in the basement, there was an overwhelming cloud of smoky smell that surrounded him.

"You can't get into bed with me," I protested, "You stink! Go take a shower with lots of soap and shampoo before you come back." The chastened hero slunk off to the bathroom before he came back to warm up. He had done a lot for the church

and community but his welcome home was provisional at first. Later the whole family gave him hugs for all he had bravely done on such a cold, cold night and we thanked him profusely.

When Sunday rolled around later, there was a good crowd at the Sunday morning service in the part of the building that had been saved

from the fire which had ravaged the other end. The members were very concerned about the extent of the damage, and a large number of them came to the church even on a very cold Sunday to inspect the building. After the service they were led in a careful line through the burned-out part of the building, which still smelled strongly, to view the charred walls, damaged ceilings, and burned interiors to the Student Lounge, Library, and student classrooms. It was a sobering view and everyone recognized it would require extensive repair and renovation, and they worried about the insurance that would cover the costs.

The story was shared about the cause of the fire. It seems it had started in some electrical part of a TV that was left on in the corner of the room that is now the lounge. It had smoldered away in the empty church until the real flames burst out late at night. A University student going home down University Avenue at 1:30 a.m. saw the flames through the windows that overlooked the street and called the Fire Department. They came quickly and managed to put it out before it spread to the sanctuary. The congregation was grateful to the unknown student and to the Fire Department, which had managed to save their church from total destruction.

According to 1970 UBC Annual Report, the damage amounted to nearly \$40,000 building damage and \$5,000 in property damage. In addition, \$9,000 was spent to clean the smoke and dust from walls and floor throughout the building.

### **Financial Secretary's Report**
