



FEBRUARY IS BLACK HISTORY MONTH

A new, second set of colors in the sanctuary this month are made with Tanzanian kanga cloths. The fabric for the eight flags, pulpit, and altar cloths was a gift to Jean Lubke from Elizabeth Moriera, director of Project Minnesota Leon, whose sister served as a Lutheran missionary in Tanzania. Kanga cloths contain a Swahili proverb. This set's phrase is "Pokea zawadi Mama upate kunienzi," meaning "Receive this gift, Mother, so you can honor me." The altar cloth also contains fabric from the first set of flags introduced this past summer.

NOTES ON THE MUSIC:

Grace Coberly notes that Homeland "is, first and foremost, a love letter. It can be happy or sad; it can unite a group of loved ones or serve as a heartfelt goodbye to a familiar place." However, especially now, it is much more than that, as you can see by the lyrics and as you hear the music.

This week continues our exploration of organ music by Black composers.

A Virginia native, Marques L. A. Garrett (he/him, b.1984) is Associate Professor of Choral Studies at the University of North Texas, and is best known for his work as a conductor, a researcher into choral music by Black composers, and as a composer, especially of choral music.

David Hurd (b.1950) is a distinguished African American composer and recitalist who was professor of church music at the General Theological Seminary, New York City for nearly 40 years. His church music, especially, is widely performed, and he received the Distinguished Composer recognition of the American Guild of Organists in 2010.

"Detroit" is an old American hymn, first published in the 1820 version of the Kentucky harmony. It is set to many different texts, including "Do I not love thee, O my God" and "forgive our sins as we forgive."
