#### **New Members - Ivan Beda and Randy Huyck**







#### **Stories from Our History**

#### **Baptism By Fire**

1996, as remembered by Jean Lubke

hristmas is a favorite time for most of us UBCers; and the 4:30 p.m. Christmas Eve service is one of the highlights of the year. Fresh spruce garlands are swagged from the three balconies adorned with red bows. A large

Christmas tree, decorated by the congregation, stands behind the pulpit. An empty handmade manger sits spotlighted in the middle of the stage.

The two candelabra candle holders hold tall, new candles and wear red bows like large bowties. The handmade green painted wooden platforms hold the clear glass candle holders and the red tapers in each window. The hanging flags have been changed from the blues of Advent to the reds and greens of Christmas.

Since at least 1954, the service has begun at 4:30 p.m.–sunset in Minneapolis–with a 30-minute prelude of various combinations of keyboards, choir, bells, soloists, and other instrumentalists. It's the concert before the service, and almost everyone is there for the concert. The lessons and carols format service then begins at 5:00 p.m.

On Christmas Eve 1996, an extra special event was being added to the program–13-year-old Susanna "Claire" Mavity had decided to be baptized.

At UBC, baptisms take place in the tiled baptistry located at the front of the sanctuary in the center

of the platform (stage). Its large wooden doors are removed, revealing to the congregation a blue and beige-tiled backdrop reminiscent of the Roman baths. Narrow tiled steps from each side provide access and regress, and in the

earlier years provided easy access to the changing stalls in the room behind. The baptistry is filled about four feet deep with water heated by the old, somewhat unreliable boiler in the basement.

That night, it was cold in the sanctuary, and steam was visible rising from the baptistry water. Since the pastor needs to perform the baptism and then get dried off to officiate the rest of the service, baptisms are usually conducted early in the service, also giving the baptismal candidate time to dry off and return before the end of the

church service to be welcomed into church membership. On this Christmas Eve, the baptism was scheduled to immediately follow the opening carol, about 5:05 p.m.

Baptismal candidates usually select a mentor to help them through the process including providing towels to cover the back-stage carpet, calming nerves and providing reassurances, providing a firm hand to help them out of the sometimes-slippery tile baptistry, and wrapping them in towels on their way to the changing room. I was honored that Claire had selected me as her mentor.

Claire's family sat in the front pew on the left side of the sanctuary to get the best views. Even Papa Pat, her father, was there. At that time, Pat served as the church's janitor and didn't often come to services.

I had planned to get everything ready backstage, throw on my choir robe to sing with the choir for the prelude, race backstage, take off my robe, help with the baptism, put my robe back on, and be back in place with the sopranos by the first choir carol. Best-laid plans!

4:25 p.m. In getting everything ready backstage, there seemed to be more than the usual amount of steam wafting from the baptistry. Pastor Nadean put her toe in the water, gasped, and yanked it back out. I checked the water and nearly scalded my hand. I knew it was way too hot for anyone to enter.

How do you quickly cool down a large tank of hot water? It was clear I wasn't going to sing in the prelude, so I went to the side sanctuary door and signaled to music director Sonja at the piano to keep going without me. I raced down the hall to the kitchen sure of finding plenty of ice. I raced back down the hall with two ice cube trays and a half-filled bag of ice and quickly dumped them in the large pool. Psssst! The ice cubes were immediately consumed by the scalding water. We need lots more! We had a white Christmas—there's snow outside! How to get it inside?

4:55 p.m. Back to the side door of the sanctuary, this time to signal for Pat's help and to let Sonja and the worship leader know to start the service without the baptism. Pat located large buckets, immediately began filling them with snow, and hauling them, unseen by the congregation, dumping them into the baptistery from the side steps. Psssssssssssst!

The mounds of snow melted slower than the ice cubes as they floated across the surface of the baptismal waters. 5:10 p.m. But we needed bucket after bucket after bucket after bucket. The water level was rising dangerously close to the top of the sill opening onto the platform. I wondered what everyone was thinking as they saw piles of floating snow. 5:30 p.m. More snow.

5:45 p.m. It was now or never. Nadean, Claire, Pat, and I tried the water. It was still really hot! "Nadean, just get in there." I said, "Dunk her quickly and get out of there! No extra prayers!" I signaled to the worship leader that we were ready. Nadean and Claire were in and out of that baptistery faster than any baptism we'd seen before—but they were intact!

Baptisms are supposed to be a memorable spiritual experience for the candidate. I know Claire's baptism was memorable!

#### Celebrating all our saints at UBC



Lots of bells were ringing at UBC on November 2 as we celebrated all our saints, an annual tradition with added history this year on our 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Among our Great Cloud of Witnesses, we named our 10 founders and many others who contributed to our survival and life as a congregation.

We welcomed a number of former members, including Jan Curtis and interim pastor Jim Ketcham from Troy, NY; Randy Huyck, son of former pastor Ken Huyck (see also page 10) from Northfield, MN; former congregational president Dave McAllister from Mankato, MN; and Allen McCormack from Indiana, who brought the bell-banner concept to us in 1984 as well as serving on the search committee that brought Pastor Nadean Bishop in 1992.

After worship, we enjoyed a potluck dinner in the Adele Fadden Assembly Room (lower left), followed by reflections from the 1800s on politics, religion, and being human by Mark Twain as channeled through Jim Ketcham (lower right). Thanks to everyone who joined this wonderful reunion!

#### In Memoriam-Mel Roy, 1929-2025



Beloved former UBC member Melvin "Mel" Roy died November 2 at his home in Belton, Missouri, at the age of 96. Born in Minneapolis and the elder brother of longtime UBC member Doug Roy (1934-2022), Mel served as a pastor with his wife, Shirley, and three children

at several churches during his career. In retirement, Mel and Shirley returned to Minnesota, active at UBC until 2013, when they moved to Belton to be near their children.

#### Getting to know our building's history



Local architectural historian team Lauren Anderson and Shannon Smith from Southeast the Minneapolis firm New History led a fascinating guided tour University Baptist Church building on November 16. Lauren and Shannon are the grant-supported team who wrote our successful application to the Minnesota




Historical Preservation Office and is now preparing the application for placement on the National Register of Historic Places.

Our building was designed by Hewitt & Brown, a leading local architectural firm of the early 1900s, which also designed such noted

buildings as St. Mark's Episcopal and Hennepin Avenue Methodist Church. The style is called Late Gothic Revival, with a mix of Tudor and contemporary elements. Construction began in 1921, with the educational wing completed in 1922. Our congregational then met in what is now the Adele Fadden Assembly Room for several years until the sanctuary was completed in 1927.

#### **Hymnal Taskforce Update**

The hymnal taskforce (Jan Curtis, Megan Dahlberg, Doug Donley, Trish Donley, Lynnette Fraser, Karole Graham, Laura Justin, Betsy Kerr, David Lesniaski, Jean Lubke, Paula Moyer, Jim Pfau, Terri Wottrich) have been busily tabulating and evaluating all of the great feedback we've been getting from you every Sunday. We are starting to eliminate a few hymns that don't speak to the majority of us. We are also eliminating ones that are now in the black hymnal (New Century) or the paperback

A Singing Faith hymnal and that are the same or better than the blue hymnal's versions. (Several that are in the black are being kept because we prefer the poetry or the verses in the blue hymnal.)

We are finding, in true Baptist fashion, that very few of the hymns we have reviewed

are liked by everyone. Most hymns have some people rating them a "1" and some people rating them a "5." Some people don't like hymns if they don't have a harmony to sing, some people love chants, some don't; some like singing in other languages, some don't; some don't like hymns that are unfamiliar to them; some love theologically "weighty" texts, some prefer "upbeat" songs of praise. The richness of diverse viewpoints!

So we are looking at the hymns that are liked by "most" of the respondents (average more than 3 on 5-point scale).

Between the 122 hymns in the blue hymnal and 168 other hymns/songs submitted (so far), we have evaluated 118 hymns. Of those, we have eliminated 38; 58 needed text updating; 21 needed something done to the music (change key, add harmony, find accompaniment, etc.). We are working through the changes

needing to be made, and we now have 23 hymns ready for digitizing and copyright permissions!

We have two more hymn-sing forums planned, for December 14 and January 11. We will continue to evaluate hymns through the end of January (not on Christmas Eve!), and then we're done. If

there are hymns you haven't heard yet and want to make sure get considered, please send them to Jean Lubke ASAP.

We also decided that instead of conducting a national hymnal competition, it would be more representative of UBC if the newly composed hymns came from our own creative talents. If you are interested in composing a hymn to be considered for the new hymnal, please contact Jean Lubke.



#### **Palmer Grant Update**

The \$40K Palmer grant we received from the American Baptist Foundation is to "enhance the vitality and sustainability of churches" by "optimizing or expanding current facilities." Our work with these funds will come in 5 different areas:

- A team will participate in Rooted Good's Good Futures Accelerator process, a requirement of the grant. The team (Doug Donley, Zena Hamilton, Laura Justin, Carrie Lubke, Jean Lubke, and Claire Mavity) will follow a self-facilitated discernment process with seven 2-hour in-person sessions (which we will condense to 6 sessions based on the work we did in our discernment process a year ago). There will be two opportunities for the whole congregation to participate in two structured activities in the middle of the process; one will be an extended forum time (including lunch) on Feb. 22. The purpose of this discernment process is to help us determine if it's possible to better use our building to serve the local community and to increase our rental income to cover all of our regular annual building expenses. This process will take about 8 months.
- We will have the opportunity and resources to spruce up the spaces we want to rent. We will have two work days, on Saturday, January 10, and Saturday, February 7, where we can all gather to clean, sort, repair, and paint several spaces we'd like to rent more. Food, supplies, and childcare will be provided by the grant. Mark the dates on your 2026 calendar. We will need all kinds of help! Robbie Steele will be coordinating these work days.
- We will add microphones and possibly lighting at the front of the sanctuary to improve the recorded / streamed sounds of actions at the front (e.g. bells, choir, concerts).
- We will document the live streaming technician's tasks and train more individuals to help.
- We will devote more resources to market/ advertise our available space.

"Creator of all life and this Earth that is our home, who is all around us,


Hallowed be thy name. Thy commonwealth come, thy will be done, on Earth as it is in heaven.
